Hedges covered in webs

The webs you may have seen on Woodman Lane just off the Stockbridge Road are apparently caused by the larvae of a tiny moth species called *Yponomeuta cagnagella* - the Spindle Ermine.

They are quite harmless and only found on Spindle. They completely defoliate sections of hedges in May. But the Spindle leaves re-grow afterwards, and there's no long-term impact on the Spindle.

The species is quite common in the chalk part of Hampshire, but numbers vary from year to year. This year seems to be a year of abundance!

Midwife Toads in Hampshire

Midwife Toads are a non native species to the UK, but have been found in several colonies in parts of the country. Hampshire has been named as one of these locations in several sources, but there are no actual records that we are aware of. Despite the lack of records, there is an anecdotal comment to suggest that Midwife Toads were known from the Littleton area and so we are reaching out to residents for their help in recording these elusive toads.



Midwife Toads are smaller than our native toads, with adults reaching around 5cm in length. They can also be distinguished by their eyes, if you are lucky enough to spot one, which have vertical pupils as opposed to horizontal/oval pupils of our two native toads. By far the best way to identify the presence of Midwife Toads is by their calls, which has been likened to “an electronic beep, like a smoke alarm with a dying battery or a New Age car alarm” by Steve Allain, one of the lead national researchers of Midwife Toads. A big difference with these toads is that they are not as reliant on ponds for breeding, as the male toads carry the eggs wrapped around their back legs, hence their name. Breeding usually takes place between April and June so they should have been calling for a few weeks now. We are hoping that residents of Littleton, and in the surrounding areas will be willing to help both Steve Allain and HIWARG, by listening out on warm damp nights for the “beeping” toads. If you do hear these calls it would be really helpful if you can record the calls on your phone, or take photos if you manage to see one. We will be arranging surveys of the Littleton area in the coming weeks, so you may see us walking the roads in small listening for calls. We will be walking at night with torches, HIWARG branded clothing (group leaders) and maybe hi vis, so feel free to come and chat to us.

Winchester Warmer Homes

Please find attached and summarised below details of the Warmer Homes initiative which residents of private housing in the Winchester district can apply to for the installation of energy efficiency measures:

- WCC is part of a the Warmer Homes Consortium comprising of 21 local authorities led by Portsmouth City Council in partnership with Agility ECO
- The Consortium was successful in bidding for funding and has been awarded £15.6 million of LAD (Phase 3) funding and £16.2 million of HUG (Phase 1) funding
- A total of £31.8 million of funding is available across the 21 local authorities involved in the Warmer Homes consortium
- LAD (Local Authority Delivery) funding is via the Green Homes Grant Scheme launched in July 2020 by the Chancellor. This funding is aimed at upgrading on-gas homes.
- HUG (Home Upgrade Grant) funding is aimed at upgrading off-gas homes.
- The Warmer Homes Consortium through a Warm Homes Fund Bid has also been successful and has received funding to enable the installation of 500 heat pumps across the consortium area
- The LAD 3 / HUG 1 funding will be available for people to apply from Wednesday 4th May 2022 and will be a gradual launch
- The scheme will run until **March 2023** and it is hoped across the whole of the consortium areas support will be provided for 1,600 on-gas-homes through LAD funding and 1,000 off-gas homes with HUG funding.
- LAD can provide funding of up to £10,000 per on-gas property. This is the same as the previous phases under LAD 1a & 1b.
- HUG can provide funding of up to £25,000 per off-gas property. An off-gas property is defined as a property that does not have gas boiler / central heating and are not connected to the mains gas network.
- The scheme is open to private rental properties but landlords will have to make a defined contribution and their permission will be required for the installation of measures



The programme is only open to private households i.e. owner occupiers and / or private rental properties.

- To be eligible for the Programme, all properties must have an EPC rating of E, For G (EPC D rated properties are allowed but the programme is limited to 30% D rated properties)

And either:

- Have an annual total household income of £30,000 or less before housing costs / bill

Or:

- Receive a benefit listed under the ECO HHCR0 criteria or be eligible under their LA's ECO flexible eligibility statement of intent

Funding is available under the programme for the following energy efficiency measures:

- Solid wall insulation
- Cavity Wall Insulation
- Underfloor insulation
- Loft Insulation
- High Heat Retention Storage Heaters
- Room-in-roof Insulation
- Air Source Heat Pumps
- Park Home External Wall Insulation
- Solar PV Panels
- Heating Controls

M3 9 to 14 safety barrier improvements - update

The M3 junction 9 to 14 all lane running upgrade has been paused. However, we're still going to carry out important safety barrier improvements on that stretch of motorway and we're now getting ready to start on the first section of work which will be between junctions 12 and 14, in both directions.

To create a safe area for the team to work in we'll be changing the road layout. This involves removing the existing road markings and installing temporary metal barriers to protect our workers from vehicles as they carry out this important upgrade.

We'll do this overnight, from **6 June 2022 for about six-weeks**. This will be on both carriageways between junctions 12 and 14. Our overnight working hours are 7pm to 7am weekdays and 6pm to 8am Saturdays and Sundays when traffic flows are at their lowest.

Please note: all activities are weather dependent and subject to logistical constraints which may delay the planned work and timeframes.

We'll update you further when we move into the next section.

We do not expect high levels of noise during this work but do understand that noise generated by the construction work will be different to what residents are used to hearing and may therefore be more obvious and we'll do what we can to keep noise to a minimum.

Hampshire Health Watch – Waiting Times Survey

The COVID-19 pandemic has resulted in many people having their planned hospital treatments delayed. We want to find out how this is affecting people locally and whether they would consider treatment at an alternative hospital in Winchester if it was available.

We also ask that primary carers for those who have waited also fill out the survey.

It is vital that NHS decision makers hear people's experiences and views of waiting for planned hospital treatment. We will not publish or share anything that identifies anyone, but the information gathered will be used to help the NHS understand how it can support people who are waiting for treatment and to inform work being undertaken to reduce waiting times. We are interested in good experiences as well as the not so good.

Who is this questionnaire for?

- People who are currently waiting for planned hospital treatment
- People who have had planned hospital treatment since April 2021 (i.e., not emergency treatment).
- Carers for someone who is waiting for, or has had planned hospital treatment since April 2021

Fraud and Crime Prevention

Bank Card Readers

Beware of receiving a new Bank Card Reader in the post unless you have specifically called your bank to request one. They could be used by scammers to get our bank card details and empty your account.

Rural Crime Prevention

Following a spate of local burglaries [Hampshire Constabulary](#) advise:

Equipment and tool security

Equipment and tool security can be a particular issue for rural businesses and farms.

To keep your belongings safe:

- lock equipment away in a secure building or part of a building when not in use
- invest in a secure storage toolbox
- install a burglar alarm on buildings where equipment is kept
- always lock vehicles when left outside and keep the keys in your possession
- keep expensive items and vehicles out of sight when not in use
- consider using hitch locks, wheel clamps or ground anchors
- mark your tools and equipment and register them
- keep a record of all valuable items
- consider fitting outside security lights

Boundaries

Take a good look around your property boundary for any potential places where it could be made more secure.

Consider:

- planting thorny hedging to act as a natural barrier
- digging deep ditches to control and deter unwanted vehicle access
- if possible, having a single-gated access point to the property
- using locking posts or temporary obstructions to control large openings
- invert and cap gate hinges
- making sure fixing bolts are secure and use covered padlocks
- installing warning signs

Estate and building security

A good standard of building security is very important in rural areas, especially for outbuildings that may not be visited for weeks at a time.

Farmhouses and other rural properties are the same as any other home, so general home security advice still applies.

However, because of the remote location, additional security measures may be beneficial.

To protect your rural home or business:

- keep the boundaries of your land and property well-maintained and secure
- keep all doors and windows shut and locked when not in use
- install a visible burglar alarm
- make sure windows and door frames are secure and in good repair
- fit strong locks to sheds, garages and outbuildings
- fit good quality window locks
- consider security bars and grilles for vulnerable windows and openings
- make sure gates cannot be lifted off or have their fixing bolts removed
- check security equipment regularly to ensure it works properly
- use locking posts or temporary obstructions to control wide access points to yards

For additional security you could also:

- install automatic security lights that come on at dusk and turn off at dawn
- install CCTV cameras to watch over the most vulnerable areas of the property
- install a monitored intruder alarm system
- install an entry control system infrared, intercom or keypad
- establish a single gated entrance and exit, removing all private access points that are not in use
